Grade SIX---8:30 to 11:30, Monday through Wednesday

<p>MONDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The civilizations along the Tigris and Euphrates rivers, where cities, writing, government, taxes, and war began. • The historic Holy Land and the literary significance of the OT and the NT. • The art, politics, architecture, religion, and literature of the people living along Egypt's fabled Nile River. 	<p>TUESDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Greek history from the Trojan War of Homer's <i>Iliad</i> to the conquests of Alexander the Great - and the Hellenistic Age that followed his death. • The treasures of Greek science, art, literature, philosophy, politics, and architecture that are the foundation of Western civilization. 	<p>WEDNESDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Roman history from Julius Caesar to the Christian Emperor Constantine. • A comparison of the beliefs and behavior of Roman society with American society today. • The economic, political, military, and cultural causes of Rome's eventual decay.
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CAMP #2 - History from the fall of the Roman Empire to the Italian Renaissance and Columbus

Grade SEVEN---8:30 to 11:30, Thursday and Friday

<p>THURSDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The medieval Catholic Church: the most successful international organization in European history – and the only one open to talent without regard to wealth or social status. • Castle and cathedral construction, and the development of armor and weapons through the early age of gunpowder. 	<p>FRIDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The lives of Leonardo, Raphael, and Michelangelo during this flowering of the visual arts known as the Italian Renaissance. • Discovery of the New World shifts the center of European power from the Mediterranean to the Atlantic nations.
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CAMP #3 - History from the Industrial Revolution to the end of World War II

Grade EIGHT---1:30 to 4:30, Thursday and Friday

<p>THURSDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Industrial Revolution, and the nationalism sparked by the French Revolution, ushers in the modern world. • The political and military career of Napoleon Bonaparte. • The influence of Adam Smith, George Washington, Thomas Malthus, and Karl Marx on history and modern thought. 	<p>FRIDAY:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Economic, political, religious, social, and military developments between 1789 and 1945. • The careers of Otto von Bismarck, Abraham Lincoln, Theodore Roosevelt, Kaiser Wilhelm II, Woodrow Wilson, V. I. Lenin, Franklin Roosevelt, Joseph Stalin, Mao Zedong, and Winston Churchill.
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CAMP #4 - History, Literature, Current Events, Basic Economics, and Politics in the Modern Age
